

# INFORMATION FOR AUTHORS

The IEEE TRANSACTIONS ON INFORMATION THEORY is a journal that publishes theoretical and experimental papers concerned with the transmission, processing, and utilization of information. The boundaries of acceptable subject matter are intentionally not sharply delimited. Rather, it is hoped that as the focus of research activity changes, a flexible policy will permit this TRANSACTIONS to follow suit. Currently appropriate topics are best reflected by recent Tables of Contents; they are summarized in the titles of editorial areas that appear on the inside front cover.

Contributions may be in the form of regular papers or of correspondence. The distinction is not one of quality, but of nature; normally a correspondence item will have one point to make briefly and without adornment, whereas a regular paper will be a more well-rounded treatment of a problem area. Correspondence items submitted for review in 2007 and beyond will be limited in length to five printed pages in the TRANSACTIONS.

Contributions should comprise novel and previously unpublished material; however, prior publication in conference proceedings of an abstract, summary, or other abbreviated, preliminary form of the material shall not preclude publication in this journal when notice of such prior or concurrent publication is given at the time of submission. The novelty will usually lie in original results, methods, observations, concepts, or applications, but may also reside in synthesis of, or new insights into, previously reported research. Thus survey and expository papers are also welcome.

Novelty alone does not assure publication; the significance of a paper and its usefulness to the TRANSACTIONS readership also will be assessed. Notice of prior submission of the material must be given at the time of submission to this TRANSACTIONS; thereafter, submission elsewhere is precluded unless the material is rejected by the TRANSACTIONS or is withdrawn by the author.

In regular papers, the title, abstract, introduction, and summary should be sufficiently informative to make the gist of the paper clear to the broadest possible audience and to place the contributions of the paper in context with related work. The body of the paper should be understandable without undue effort by its intended audience. Supporting material not of central interest is best relegated to appendices.

Correspondence should be less discursive but equally lucid. Authors should be aware that a well-written correspondence usually can be published more rapidly than can a regular paper.

**Preparation of Manuscripts:** Each regular paper and correspondence should include an informative abstract of not more than 200 words. The abstract should be self-contained and

should be written in the passive voice. A list of index terms (key words and phrases) should be given after the abstract, a total of five to ten words in length. The terms should be relatively independent and, as a group, should characterize the paper. Authors should be prepared to supply upon notification of acceptance originals of figures, biographical sketches, and a signed copyright form (see below).

In all other respects, papers should be prepared for publication as described in the "IEEE Author Kit," which is available from IEEE Periodicals, 455 Hoes Lane, Piscataway, NJ 08855, USA, or [trans@ieee.org](mailto:trans@ieee.org). **Submissions:** Papers should be submitted via the Pareja web-based manuscript management system. Instructions and a link to this system can be found at:

Authors must indicate whether the manuscript is to be reviewed as a regular paper or as a correspondence. Also, it would be helpful if a suggested Editorial Area (see the inside front cover) were given. Authors should be prepared to supply, upon request, copies (preferably electronic copies) of any reference material that is both essential for the reviewing process and unavailable to the reviewers.

**Page Charges:** If the manuscript is accepted for publication, the author's company or institution will be requested to cover part of the cost of publication. Page charges for this journal are not obligatory nor is their payment a prerequisite for publication. The author will receive 100 free reprints without covers if the charge is honored. Detailed instructions will accompany the proof.

**Copyright:** It is the policy of the IEEE to own the copyright to the technical contributions it publishes on behalf of the interests of the IEEE, its authors, and their employers, and to facilitate the appropriate reuse of this material by others. To comply with the U.S. Copyright Law, authors are required to sign an IEEE Copyright Form before publication. This form, which appears in every January issue of this journal, returns to authors and their employers full rights to reuse their material for their own purposes. Authors should be prepared to submit a signed copy of this form if their manuscripts are accepted.
